


A: Ohio must invest to provide affordable, accessible child care options.

Unaffordable, inaccessible child care in Ohio is holding back women and young children. The child care crisis is a women's economic prosperity crisis.

Women, specifically mothers, pay the price.

Female-headed households are more than three times as likely as all Ohio households to live in poverty, and having children in the household increases the likelihood of living in poverty by four-fold.



Child care challenges hold women back from workforce participation.


Two-thirds of Ohio mothers with children under five who do not currently work full time say they would go back to work if they had access to high quality and affordable child care. Instead, over 1 in every 3 women in Ohio women changed their work schedules and 1 in 4 cut back hours due to child care arrangements disruptions.

Gender wage gap + unaffordable child care = women cannot thrive

The average annual cost for one infant's child care in Ohio is over \$12,000 annually—over \$1,000/month. iii However, median earnings for women in the labor force full-time year-round in Ohio is \$44,230.



Ohio provides the lowest level of support to families in the country

Ohio now has the lowest eligibility for Publicly Funded Child Care (PFCC) in the country for kids 0 to 5 at 145% of the Federal Poverty Level. (In 2024, that is \$37,399/year for a family of three.) All other states have raised funding levels to support more families.

Ohio: The last place for child care support to low-income households.

For many Ohioans, child care is simply unavailable.

39% of Ohioans live in a child care desert, areas with no child care providers or very little availability. 41% of white Ohioans, 37% of Hispanic or Latino Ohioans, and 29% of Black Ohioans live in a child care desert. In Ohio, child care deserts are most prevalent in rural areas.




Ohio households live in areas with little or no available child care.
